

Emil George Moxey, Ph.D.



Emil George Moxey, Ph.D., A.C.S.W., was born in Nassau, Bahamas. He graduated from St. John's College (Anglican secondary school), Nassau, after earning the Cambridge University Overseas Senior School Certificate. Subsequently, he was awarded the Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology by Virginia Union University and the Master of Social Work degree by Fordham University. The Ph.D. in Clinical Practice was conferred upon him by New York University's School of Social Work in 1977. He is also a member of the Academy of Certified Social Workers.

Dr. Moxey is currently a tenured professor of Community and Human Services, and Social Science, at the Bedford-Stuyvesant Unit of the Metropolitan Center of S.U.N.Y./Empire State College, Brooklyn,

which recently honored him for his contributions. Before this appointment he was a Senior Social Worker-Clinician at the Youth Consultation Service of the Newark, New Jersey Episcopal Diocese; Plainfield Consultation Center, Plainfield, New Jersey; and the Adolescent Clinic of Brooklyn Jewish Hospital and Medical Center. He was also the Assistant Director and Coordinator of Field Work for the ANSWER/Bachelor of Social Welfare Program at the Manhattan Center of Adelphi University (1985-1989). During this period he taught graduate social work courses at Adelphi and New York Universities.

Music has always had a great deal of meaning in Dr. Moxey's life. During high school days he participated in the chorus and performed in H.M.S. Pinafore and The Pirates of Penzance. Later he was a member of the Junior and Senior Choirs of Welsey Methodist Church, Grant's Town, Nassau; and the Senior Choirs of St. Philip's Church, Richmond, Virginia; St. Martin's Church, Harlem; and St. Philip's Church, Brooklyn, where he also serves as Co-Chair of the Organ Committee. The Crusaders Guild/Brotherhood of St. Andrew's of St. Philip's, honored Dr. Moxey this past May for over thirty-five years of community service as a social worker, professor and chorister.
